Zebra mussels have found Bay Lake; goal is to minimize their impact, keep out new invasives

This fall, zebra mussels (ZMs) were found in all parts of Bay Lake — on equipment, lifts, dock posts, swim ladders and a few boats. With more than 2,500 launches per year at our public access, it may have been inevitable that we would become infested.

Typically, it takes several years to fully infest a lake. Lake conditions and chemical make-up of the water affect the mussels' ability to thrive and reproduce. Unfortunately, Bay Lake offers ZMs pretty perfect conditions.

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) believes our infestation is four to five years old. An infestation usually starts slowly and ramps up after year four or five, so we should expect a major expansion in 2020 or 2021. Equipment that sits in the lake will likely become home to ZMs. When possible, raise boats and motors completely out of the water to protect them, and drain all water when possible.

How ZMs work

Each individual ZM can produce up to 1 million veligers, their microscopic larvae, which are

released mid-summer and circulate until finding a place to land, usually a hard surface or plant. ZMs can survive cold Minnesota winters, but they cannot survive out of the water for more than five days. That said, ZMs do not release their grip once dead; they must be scraped or power washed to be removed. And dead ZMs stink! If there are a lot of them, the best way to dispose of them is to bury them or place them in the garbage.

What's next

Experts and those at other infested lakes are providing advice to help us minimize the

impact of Bay Lake's infestation. We will publish recommendations as they are developed. We are also planning one or more ZM workshops for Spring 2020. Residents on other lakes, such as Gull, Pelican and Mille Lacs, have been living with ZMs for years and have found ways to live with them. We will too.

We will continue our boat inspection program in 2020. We need to protect Bay Lake from new and even more destructive invasives.

Good news on EWM as control efforts continue

We continued our Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) control program this season with excellent results.

We treated 14 acres of EWM in June and then 20 acres the first part of October, totaling 34 acres for the season. We have had the weather on our side with high water, heavy snow cover and rainy springs and falls the last several years, which has really helped us keep EWM in check. That has made for better recreational use of the lake and allowed the native plants to flourish. As usual, we will continue our control program next spring.

Thanks for everyone's support for this program over the years. We could not have done it without you.

Bay Lakers Look Back

I was three years old in 1934 and living in Iowa. We were on vacation in Ely and stopped overnight at Bay Lake on our way home. Our travel took us to Knieff's Shore Acres Resort on the northeast side of Bay Lake. This stay was only overnight, but we returned each summer starting in 1935 for one or two weeks. The only years we missed were during World War II due to gas rationing.

Hugo and Hattie Knieff and their son Al owned the resort. They had 11 cabins, and six were destroyed by a tornado in 1973. The destroyed cabins were replaced with a mobile home park.

During our yearly trips in the 1930s the cabins had running water, outhouses for bathrooms and no electricity. Hugo and Al delivered ice twice a week for the icebox. Each winter ice was cut by Hugo and Al from the lake. They stored the ice in a large building with sawdust and tarps for

insulation. Kerosene lanterns were used for lighting during the evening. "Chamber Pots" were used during the night if you preferred to use them rather than visiting the outhouse.

REA electricity came later so we had electricity for lights and a refrigerator. Bathrooms were added with showers a few years later, so we had the comforts of home.

When we moved to Minnesota in 1970 I made arrangements with Al to rent a cabin for five months each year. When my two daughters married, we rented a cabin for each of them and their spouses.

Today our family rents four cabins, and one daughter and family have a home on Bay Lake. Each family member has many wonderful memories of our times at the lake. This includes four generations today.

She can remember Grandma Hansen, Curt Hansen's mother, operating the cash register at Hansen's Store. She remembers using an outhouse and drinking water from a pump in the cabin kitchen.

Kate Krueger's family rented a cabin on Woodland Beach before her folks bought one of their own on Eaglewood about 1942. On Woodland Beach, they would walk to LaBrant's small store for groceries and a daily ice cream cone. Black raspberry revel was her favorite. Mrs. Harris, who owned a dairy farm on Bay Lake, delivered milk and served chicken dinner every Sunday. Krueger's mother would buy jam and other things at Hunt's Cannery, and her older sister, Nancy, worked there picking raspberries.

"I can't remember how my mother washed clothes, but I remember her rinsing bed linens in the lake," said Krueger.

Women and children would spend summers at the lake with the car, and men would come on the bus to Garrison on weekends. During a polio epidemic in the 1950s, women and children stayed at the lake until the first frost.

There were plenty of kids to play with, including Krueger's three sisters. They spent many happy hours swimming and playing off a raft supported by barrels. They did scavenger hunts, played triple solitaire and board games, and did jigsaw puzzles.

"Those were wonderful summers," said Krueger.
